Are there fresh edible natural plants in Adak? YES there is!

As the summer changes to fall then eventually winter, are you missing the taste of fresh vegetation on the dinner plate? Too expensive to have vegetables and fruit sent on the plane? Mother Nature is available to satisfy your cravings and save you money too! All it takes is time to go for a walk as you enjoy the beautiful fall colors. It's time to go to the 'store outside your door.' Other than berries, what else can you look for?

Fireweed is a tall perennial herb with many dense, narrow leaves. Bright fuchsia flowers grow in long terminal clusters and are very showy. Blooms begin at the base of the cluster and mature up the stem as the season progresses. Fireweed is edible: early season shoots are a delicacy when peeled, and can be eaten raw or steamed as a substitute for asparagus. Very young leaves are edible in salads and soups or seeped to make a pale, sweet (and slightly laxative) tea. Buds and flowers can be sprinkled in salads, mixed into scones, or used to make vinegar, syrup or jelly. When harvesting flowers be sure to select young, undamaged blossoms, as older blossoms will be bitter. Summer stems can be split and drawn through the teeth to remove the sweet marrow.

For a snack along the trail, look for Chocolate Lily bulbs. Other names for this plant are Black Lily, Skunk Lily, Dirty Diaper and Outhouse Lily, Indian Rice, Rice Lily, Northern Rice-root, Kamchatka Lily, Kamchatka Fritillary. The Aleut name for the plant is Saranax (from the Russian Sarana). The lilies are easy to identify, even after they've lost their distinctive flowers, because the leaves occur in whorls. Tiny rice-like bulblets surrounding the main Chocolate Lily bulb have been a staple of indigenous people since prehistoric times. They can be eaten in any season, but the traditional time to harvest is in the fall, after the flowers are gone and the leaves have turned yellow, indicating the plant is storing starches and sugars in its bulbs for the coming winter. You'll notice when you harvest bulbs that at least a few of the little bulblets remain in the hole – don't try to pick them all out, as those left behind will grow into new plant next spring.

These can be eaten raw, cooked or dried for later use. Once dried it can be used whole or pounded into flour. If you happen to get a batch that tastes slightly bitter, just soak them in water overnight before using. The traditional method of dipping or storing them in seal oil is also supposed to sweeten their flavor, and mixing them with berries is said to be very nice. When you're out hiking in the hills, chocolate lilies provide a great excuse to take a little picnic break – kids especially love digging up the bulbs, rubbing them between their hands to remove the dirt and nibbling them happily. .

While you are out gathering bulbs, don't forget there are lots of other roots to enjoy! Dandelion roots can be peeled of their brown, then steamed or boiled until just tender. Everyone knows Dandelion greens are wonderful in spring but did you know they can also be tasty in the fall, once the first frost has removed much of the older leaves' bitterness? Clover roots can also be cleaned of small fibrous parts and boiled until tender, served with seasonings or added to stews. Bog orchid roots are lovely steamed. For a rutabaga-like treat, try boiling the roots of Putchki, also known as Cow Parsnip or Wild Celery, sliced into 1" pieces, until nearly tender, then place in a shallow greased dish, season with salt and paprika to taste, sprinkle with brown sugar, a bit of grated lemon peel and a couple spoonfuls of lemon juice; dot with butter and bank uncovered for about half an hour.

Customer Service stands ready to assist our customers!

By calling our office from any Adak landline or cellular phone dialing 611, we will assist with installation of new services, are able to set up your auto-pay, paperless eBill, set up equipment rentals, sign up for Broadband Management, provide more information on our services and assist with billing concerns.

Auto-pay is a method of payment by providing your credit card information; we can set up a monthly payment plan. No need to send in payment or call every month to initiate a payment

on your monthly billing. At your request, we will email your receipt for your records. Our customers who use this method of payment never go back to sending a check thru the mail. We also offer thru the adaktu.net website a link for making a payment thru Pay Pal.

Paperless eBill is a method of sending your monthly billing to you by email for as long as you have service with AEE. If you want your monthly invoice on same day of billing and do not want to wait for the mail, please call our office and this will be set up. More than half of our customers use this convenient method of getting their invoices as soon as billing is finished and have reduced the amount of paper they receive.

Our equipment rental service is easily accessible by calling our office, a lease form is sent to you by email and we include information on the insurance required, what the charge is for no insurance, rental prices and how to reach the Adak operations to pick up your rental.

Setting up the Broadband Management Tool is done at time of new service; customer service will provide you by email information on using the tool along with a username and password. We also welcome questions and concerns which with the help from our IT department does a great job in assisting the new broadband customer on monitoring their bandwidth to avoid any overages.

We are available Monday thru Thursday for questions and concerns on any of our services and packages we offer! is? Consumers are understandably concerned about the privacy and security of the sensitive, personal data their telecommunication carrier collects in the provision of service. In recognition of these concerns, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) issued rules and regulations all telecommunication companies must follow to ensure they adequately protect their subscribers CPNI. AEE works to protect your privacy by doing the following: ask customers for an account password when they apply for services: restrict unauthorized private verifv access to information: picture/government issued ID cards when customer is in office or store; calling customers' back to their assigned telephone number from the telephone company; or ask for the answer to a security question if password is forgotten. Telecommunication carriers must notify customers immediately whenever a password, customer response to a back-up means of authentication for lost or forgotten passwords, online account, or address of record is created or changed.



What is The National Do Not Call Registry?

It gives you a choice about whether to receive telemarketing calls or not.

This national registry was established to address unwelcome telemarketing calls. It applies to any plan, program, or compaign to sell goods or services through interstate phone calls. This also includes telemarketers who solicit consumers often on behalf of third party sellers. It also includes sellers who provide, offer to provide, or arrange for payment. Consumers may register their residential and wireless telephone numbers on the National Do Not Call Registry at no cost.

To register, call 1-888-382-1222 (for TTY call 1-866-290-4236) or go to <u>www.donotcall.gov</u> on the internet. This website provides great information on the Basics of the Registry, Stopping Unwanted Calls, Reporting Illegal Calls, Details and Problems with Registration and When You Might Need to Register Again.

Your number will remain on the registry permanently. You can remove your number from the list at any time.

You may still receive political calls, charitable calls, debt collection calls, informational calls, and telephone survey calls.

<u>2018 NYO GAMES ALASKA</u> <u>TEAMWORK. LEADERSHIP. RESPECT.</u>

The 2018 Native Youth Olympics (NYO) took place in Anchorage from April 26 to April 28 at the Alaska Airlines Center on the University of Alaska Anchorage (UAA) campus. Adak School sent four student athletes to compete: Adrien, Ramzes, Beth, and Vuna Jr. Also with the student athletes was their reliable team manager, Augie. The events they competed in were the Kneel Jump, Eskimo Stick Pull, Scissor Broad Jump, Indian Stick Pull, One-Foot High Kick, and Seal Hop. Although no medals were won by the Adak Eagles in 2018, they continue to practice for and participate in future NYO Games. With lots of practice, they will bring home lots of medals soon!

The Games are one of a small handful of events – along with World Eskimo-Indian Olympics (WEIO) and the Arctic Winter Games – based on traditional northern latitude contests. While WEIO is limited to Native athletes, NYO Games Alaska and the Arctic Winter Games are open to all participants as a way of sharing and celebrating Native traditions.

From Alaska's largest city to its most remote village, athletes travel distances near and far to enjoy competition and camaraderie with old friends and new. Each year, hundreds of students from about 50 teams representing more than 100 communities across the state complete in the NYO Games. Separated by distance, tradition, and tribal identity, NYO athletes are nevertheless united by a common desire to honor and practice the Alaska Native games of their ancestors.

The Kneel Jump was used to strengthen the leg muscles for jumping from ice floe to ice floe and for lifting fallen prey when hunting. The Eskimo Stick Pull was used to develop balance and hand strength as practice for pulling seals from the ice. The Scissor Broad Jump traditionally was used to practice balance needed when jumping on ice floes, and to keep warm. The Indian Stick Pull is a Dene' game representing grabbing a slippery salmon and develops hand and arm strength. The One-Foot High Kick was used to signal a successful hunt. The Seal Hop is a game of endurance and stamina that reflects sneaking up on seals on the ice.


What started as a way for Alaska Native students within the boarding school system to stay connected to their cultural traditions is now an annual statewide event drawing more than 1,000 athletes from over 100 communities across the state.

Information from the 2018 NYO official event guide

NYO is a year-round program that has a quantifiable positive impact on more than 2,000 youth each year. In a survey emphasizing NYO's impact, 397 NYO athletes in grades 7 - 12 who competed in the 2017 Senior Games offered the following insight:

- 73% credited NYO as an incentive to stay in school
- 69% improved or maintained good grades in order to continue participation in NYO games
- 73% indicated improved self-confidence
- 48% indicated improved leadership and self-esteem
- 75% reported a greater sense of work ethic
- 85% see themselves as a role-model for future NYO athletes
- 87% learned about Alaska Native culture and values
- 91% developed new friendships with other athletes, coaches, and teachers
- 9% stopped using tobacco products
- 6% stopped using alcohol
- 4% stopped using illegal substances
- 65% indicated they practice at least 6 10 hours per week

QUINTILLION FIBER SYSTEM IN SERVICE!

A couple years ago in an annual newsletter was a feature article on the first subsea fiber optic line connecting the internet directly from Japan to Europe through the Northwest Passage. After two summers of installation and testing, the system went live on December 1, 2017 for five northern Alaska communities! The system performed flawlessly during test mode and will now be made available to service providers in Utqiagvik, Wainwright, Point Hope, Nome and Kotzebue, enabling 21st century communications in the Alaska Arctic for the first time. This high-speed internet is enabling improved health and education services, help spur economic development, empower local businesses and allow consumers access to video and other high-speed applications that were previously unavailable or unaffordable for many potential end-user



customers.

A new terrestrial fiber between Fairbanks and Prudhoe Bay has been installed along the Dalton Highway and is now in service. At Fairbanks, the new fiber connects to existing networks reaching Anchorage, Portland and Seattle.

Phase Two is the Pacific segment, planned to extend the backbone cable from Nome branching west to

Asia, with options for additional branches into Alaska.

Phase Three is the Canada-United Kingdom segment, extending the subsea system east of the Prudhoe Bay, branching along the Lower Northwest Passage to Canada and onto the United Kingdom.



AT INSTALL of internet service, the customer is provided FREE a Bandwidth Management tool and information on using the tool. By accessing this website with the provided username and password, the customer will know their own bandwidth usage either by day, week or month. A great tool to monitor the usage and prevent going over the bandwidth limit.

WE ALSO for our Broadband customers, email a courtesy weekly alert to those customers who have gone 50% and over their bandwidth plan limit. The courtesy alerts are sent to keep you informed of the percentage wise on your usage. This alert is intended for you to carefully manage your internet usage until the 20th of the month, when the new usage cycle begins.

ADAK TELEPHONE UTILITY and WINDY CITY CELLULAR offer Lifeline, a government assistance program which offers a discounted home or wireless phone service for eligible customers. The program is limited to one discount per household. Customers can qualify for a federal Lifeline benefit with proof of eligibility by their household income, participating in federal assistance programs or Tribalspecific federal assistance programs. State assistance programs are no longer accepted for the federal discount. Annual eligibility recertification is required. ALASKA K-12 BROADBAND INITIATIVE

Alaska is partnering with the national non-profit Education SuperHighway to work on bringing high-speed broadband to schools across Alaska. Almost 120 schools in Alaska do not have modern fiber networks and close to half of Alaska students cannot access the internet at levels which meet FCC minimum connectivity goals.

The Education SuperHighway is doing a comprehensive assessment of K-12 connectivity across Alaska's classrooms. By identifying schools without sufficient broadband bandwidth and infrastructure, and provide technical and project management resources to help schools upgrade.

Governor Bill Walker is quoted "The internet is the electricity of the 21st century, and a quality education requires connectivity. The K-12 Broadband initiative will help us achieve our goal of ensuring every Alaska school has the access they need to provide our students with the education they deserve".

The Education SuperHighway is currently working in 24 other states, and is funded by private foundations including the Chan Zuckerberg initiative, the Ford Foundation, and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.



Need help paying for higher education?

ALASKA TELEPHONE ASSOCIATION offers annual scholarships to Alaska resident students to attend accredited higher education institutions. Scholarships for 2018 will be available in the spring. The requirements for the scholarships are: Be sponsored by an Active or Associate Member of Alaska Telephone Association (Adak Telephone Utility is a member for an Adak student to pursue this scholarship opportunity!); have to be a resident of Alaska for not less than 4 years, or have attended school in Alaska for at least 2; demonstrated student success in an academic or vocational field; and plan to attend an accredited post secondary school or training program for at least one year.
